



Tell us about life after WES.

After WES I went to Sidwell Friends School in Washington, DC. WES prepared me in so many ways—honestly, I could spend the rest of this page listing them out! Key among them was Reverend Baker's Religion class. She encouraged us to debate and discuss the meaning behind the texts we read, sparking my interest in speech and debate. This became my main extracurricular activity at Sidwell!

Mr. Wahl was also a defining influence—I still point to his seventh-grade Geography class as the reason I've been interested in economics. He really changed my life. At Sidwell I tried to make anything and everything I did relate to this interest.



My obsession with economics drew me to UC Berkeley. UC Berkeley has the world's best public and development economics programs. I remember separately talking to professors at two different universities both saying they had lost their best to UC Berkeley. My dream was to do research with Emmanuel Saez, who has almost single-handedly created public economics as a serious field of study.

Tell us about your major and anything new you're involved with.

I started as an Economics major, but being in the Bay Area, this "tech startup" craze was everywhere. So, I decided to see what it was about by taking an introductory computer science class, and by my sophomore year I ended up adding it as a second major. I love it, and I have a lot of ideas for what to build to solve real world problems. Freshman year I started a company with my roommate, CKPantry, an on-demand delivery service for popular snacks and candy in our dorms. By sophomore year I had worked on Presidential Actions, an app that allowed you to easily see every executive order or decision made by the White House. We had about 3,000 users at our peak. I interned in San Francisco at a tech startup, Way2B1, and then this year a couple of friends founded a data analytics startup, Archer, that I decided to join in on. I've been working on Archer for the past year, on product, business development, and software engineering.

At the same time I've still retained my love for economics. I did research predicting interest rates using machine learning methods on federal reserve documents. I'm starting my honors thesis this semester, and I'm about to ask Emmanuel Saez to be my thesis advisor!

Your teachers recall your enthusiasm for debate while at WES. Does this still hold true?

Absolutely. Most of my friends jokingly refer to me as the least 'Computer Science' among my group because I'm always pulling people aside to discuss and debate new government actions, market changes, etc. To this day, people call me crazy for being a member of Berkeley College Republicans and Cal Democrats; with all the political activism and tension at UC Berkeley regarding free speech, I spend a large chunk of my time debating and understanding people at both ends of the political spectrum.

Tell us about your travels.

What is the last book you read, aside from school assignments?

I just read *Radical Candor* by Kim Scott. It's about how to be a great boss without "losing your humanity" as the author puts it. I'm on a nonfiction streak right now but I've actually mostly read fiction. Ever since Mrs. Durling's reading challenge I don't think I've stopped. She really encouraged us to set concrete goals to read outside of the classroom.

Or what do you like to do with your free time?

Honestly, most of my free time is spent working on Archer or political tech side-projects. But when I do have the time, I cook. Usually it's either American-Chinese food or Pakistani food. I get it from my parents—they're both incredible cooks.

What are some of your fondest memories as a WES student?

It's hard to give one answer for this—they vary. One in particular was during the Utah trip. I was paired with James Hemus '11, this guy who I hadn't really talked to and wasn't in any of my classes. It was during that trip that we became good friends, so much so that I still keep up with him. I actually saw him in Berkeley over spring break!

Another was learning to solo as part of the after-school Jazz band. I remember looking up to Hunter Heflin '10, our first-chair saxophonist, and learning to solo from him and the really great teachers that WES had. I still play.
