












A Challenging School Year Ends with Heartfelt Expressions of Gratitude













ON THE LAST DAY OF SCHOOL—June 9—a flock of parents and students gathered early in the morning so that they could greet faculty and staff members, face-to-face, with cheers and praise for their hard work to make the best of a difficult school year.

Families lined the stairs to the main entrance and applauded. They cheered, rang bells and blew horns to greet teachers and staff as they arrived. Holding signs that said "thank you," students clapped, blew bubbles, and shook pompoms as they scanned the crowd for their beloved teachers. Many in attendance found it simply too difficult to contain their excitement as they saw teachers approach the entrance of the school, and ran to the teachers and embraced them-offering group hugs in a year where social distancing of six feet was required and observed, and warm embraces were reserved for family members only. Tears could be seen above the masks from more than a few faculty members as well as parents.

An emotional Head of School Danny Vogelman said to the gathered crowd that while he has worked in education for 25 years, "what I saw this morning and how you treated our faculty and staff is probably the coolest and most heartwarming thing I've seen in all of those 25 years."



The idea for this surprise celebration originated from WES parent Sharon D'Emidio who, like most parents and guardians, could see first-hand how much effort and heart went into delivering a full program this year. "I had a front row seat to distance learning with my second-grader, Cassie," commented D'Emidio. "My fourth-grader was more independent when it came to distance learning but I witnessed how the teachers were doing amazing things—taking it full

on. And it wasn't just the homeroom teachers—many, many people made it happen every day. They were teaching 100% virtually, or teaching in person and also teaching to the students at home. And many teachers had their own children to take care of at home—I don't know how they juggled it all," she added. Knowing how grateful her family was to the teachers and the staff who kept everyone safe and made school function every single day, she was convinced that all the other families at WES felt the same way. The question remained: how to show their appreciation in a pandemic when

safety protocols prohibit in person meetings and parents have not been in the building since the winter of 2020? "It got me to thinking. It's great that we can thank some people at drop off, and our PA snack carts and faculty appreciation week certainly brightened their days. But I wanted us, as a community, to reflect back to the

teachers and staff in a profound way, a culmination of what they did this whole year," she expressed.

So in late May, Sharon spoke with Danny Vogelman about her plan: to have families line the steps and applaud as faculty arrived, so that the faculty would deeply feel how grateful everyone was for this challenging school year. "We decided that the last day of school would be the best day. So Parents Association President Bess Puvathingal was on board with the covert



plan and the PA Reps emailed all the families on Friday, asking them to come out early Wednesday morning—careful to avoid emailing any parents who are on faculty. As I approached the school just after 7 a.m. that Wednesday, I wasn't sure how many people would be there," said D'Emidio. But the crowd was big and growing larger. "It proves that showing up is powerful," she added. And that getting up extra early on the last day of school is a sacrifice that students and families were willing to make, demonstrating that a simple act of kindness can be formidable. "For us, I believe it was a big exhale," Sharon remarked.

"This year was crazy. It was incredibly challenging, and we, as a community, did an amazing job," Vogelman added. >













Early Childhood

Nursery · Transition · Kindergarten · Grade 1

The three "P's" of the pandemic could easily be Perseverance, Patience, and Pride. We applaud the early childhood children, parents, and faculty for their perseverance in wearing masks, maintaining distance (for the most part!), and receiving weekly COVID testing. The Early Childhood students' patience has also been tested this year, as they waited for their first field trip experiences which consisted of all classes walking along the Capital Crescent Trail in April to view the cherry blossoms.

Later, Kindergarten students—who were bursting with excitement as they disembarked from their cars during morning arrival carrying nets, wearing hats and wellies, with the scent of sunscreen in their midst—enjoyed the mud, the water and the wildlife with Ranger Jen at nearby Loughborough Mill. Finally, first-graders were able to

culminate their study of Japan with an outdoor Japanese tea party under a fully-decorated tent.

The pride the students felt was palpable when they gave their best efforts to entertain their families virtually with an assortment of spring songs at their annual May Day Spring Festival, and then when they enthusiastically participated in Field Day games. It was not easy singing or competing wearing a mask, keeping six feet apart from friends, and waiting for a turn to perform or take part in the water balloon toss. But all persevered, were patient, and the pride was evident in the children's poise and confident composure throughout these events and during the whole year. This year we often find ourselves saying "this is one for the history books," and can only congratulate the entire WES community on a job well done!

Throughout the second semester, our Elementary Dragons found innovative ways to participate in beloved culminating projects and activities, and explore new ways of showcasing their work. Just as the Brood X cicadas emerged from the ground, Grade 2 and Grade 5 students embarked on Covid-safe field trips. Grade 2 students enjoyed delightful weather on the beach at Breezy Point State Park. They hunted for sharks' teeth before sharing a picnic with friends and families. In connection with their social studies curriculum, Grade 5 Dragons explored the beautiful and strategically important town of Harpers Ferry in West Virginia. They hiked to the cemetery, toured the museums, completed a scavenger hunt, and of course visited an old-time candy store.

Grade 4's traditional *Biography Tea* took on a virtual form this year. Students researched the life of someone special to them and then used the app *Storyjumper* to compose a narrative and create a digital picture book that they shared with friends and families during an afternoon celebratory Zoom. Grade 3 students culminated their final quarter social studies project with an *Ancient Civilizations Mini-Museum*. Presenting outside under the "big

tent," student groups shared their research into the daily life, government, culture, and geography of Ancient Egypt,

China, Rome, and Mesopotamia. Students also shared their collaborative and creative 3-D multi-media maps and models. Visitors were able to "tour" the Great Wall of China, see up close King Tut's tomb and death mask, and view many other artifacts connected with the ancient civilizations.

Despite this strangest of years, there is no doubt that Elementary Dragons delved deep into learning, engaged in authentic hands-on experiences, and thrived being back in school in the second semester. They strengthened friendships, learned to navigate and negotiate learning partners and play, and they worked together to exemplify being kind, confident, and prepared. We are so proud of what our community has accomplished this year, and can't wait to see what we can achieve together next year!

We ended our year with outstanding student participation in the Grade 6 and 7 Poetry Slam, as well as dynamic and inspiring speeches on SGA Election Day.




























































The Show Must Go On!

In a year filled with uncertainty, the WES community stepped forward without hesitation, through ups and downs, adapting to an evolving situation this school year with grace and generosity. Stalwart volunteers and steadfast donors—new families and those who have been with us for decades—blazed trails with us as we navigated a strange and at times scary landscape. Through this commitment, our community is stronger. Here are key elements to what turned out to be another successful year in the 35th year of the school.

ANNUAL FUND

Under the leadership of Martha and Ryan Orzechowski, the Every Dragon, Every Day Annual Fund Campaign brought in more than 375 donations from WES families, alumni, parents of alumni, grandparents, faculty, and former faculty to raise just over \$355,000, surpassing our goal. In this challenging year, over 93% of our current families contributed. We are grateful to the Orzechowskis and the team of 11 Annual Fund reps whose hard work paid great dividends. The Annual Fund is the single biggest revenue source for the school outside of tuition. This outpouring of support is a wonderful testament to the power and impact we can have when we come together to work toward a common goal.

AUCTION

Brought together by their love of travel, Natalya Bah, Theresa Carnegie, and Tulika Narayan decided three years ago that they would Co-Chair the WES Auction in 2021. Little did they know the long and twisting road they would encounter, but this brave trio forged ahead with Aloha WES, the first virtual Auction Gala in the school's history. "Given the situation around the pandemic, we knew planning the event, which started last summer, would be tricky," stated Director of Development Claire Henderson. Three scenarios were in the works for the event: in-person (outside in a tent), virtual, and hybrid, and the event date was pushed from late February to May, with the hopes of having the situation improve. Meanwhile, there were Zoom Auction meetings, parent packets and invitations to tackle, and a wine party to plan. Luckily, Tulika Narayan's neighbor, Casper Rice, is a renowned wine connoisseur in DC and graciously agreed to help us craft our party and advised us on wines. Ultimately, he provided a wine tasting for our virtual wine party on February 25. This fun and well-attended event was our highest netting wine party ever, bringing in more than \$10,000—which helped build our wine category and also went toward the Auction's bottom line.

As the weeks ticked by, the Co-Chair team, along with the committee and Development Office, were faced with many decisions to make about the format of the Gala, considering county restrictions. It became clear that the event would be entirely virtual which required selecting an auction technology platform, a new auctioneer; a livestream producer for the event; and a caterer to provide take-home meals and

wines. "We had to move swiftly, learn a new system for data entry, and a new virtual auction platform in about a month's time," said Henderson. "What we missed most about this Auction was seeing our volunteers—planning, laughing, stuffing envelopes, making decorations, and wrapping baskets," commented Ali Bratun from the Development Office. Finally, a small team came together to decorate outside, and then a larger group handed out flamingo and pineapple cake pops expertly made by Karaine Howard, and rallied people to RSVP. Committee members also distributed dinners at the front of the school on Auction day.

Auction night went off very smoothly, as auctioneer Steve Little, along with Athletic Director Bill Isola, presided over the event, directing attendees during the one-hour production which included seven short videos featuring students and faculty, offering a glimpse into the day of our WES Dragons, as well as a faculty performance. Afterwards, a group of parent volunteers orchestrated a fun Aloha After Party on Zoom, with games and prizes so that we could see each other, albeit remotely, and socialize.

So what was the outcome? After an uncertain start, this Auction Gala made history by netting more than \$230,000, including \$131,000 in Raise Your Paddle (RYP) funds, thanks to our kind, generous, and patient WES community. This year's RYP project will provide a new outdoor gathering space near the Dragon Innovation and STEM Lab, to be used by students, faculty, and guests. The completion date is by the end of summer. We are extremely grateful to our Co-Chairs, committee, patrons, sponsors, donors, attendees, advertisers, and class project coordinators, for sticking with us, and for their generosity in making this Auction one to remember!

PARENTS ASSOCIATION

The Parents Association (PA) had great success with their three-pronged approach to the school year. Under the direction of the leadership team of Bess Puvathingal (Milde) (President), Natalya Bah (Vice President), Sarah Beale Demarest (Secretary), Gustav Hofverberg (Treasurer), and Shivani Gupta, (PA Representative Director), the group's focus on Community Building, Parent Education, and Faculty Appreciation provided a clear and simplified pathway.

In a year where typical community gatherings was limited or non-existent, the PA conjured many creative ways to keep our community whole.

Community Building

Creativity was in high gear as the PA imagined a full calendar of engaging and fun events. A contest to name an ice cream flavor at neighboring Sarah's Handmade Ice Cream revealed "Dragon's Breath" as the winner—mint Oreo with marshmallows, anyone? Good evening, WES Dragons—a familiar phrase indeed—inspired a community-wide challenge to see who could best impersonate Mr. Vogelman's Sunday evening greeting. Exercise classes were a big hit

from a Peloton ride to outdoor yoga. A virtual game night brought people together to play Kahoots! Who let the dogs out? March 12 was unique as dogs, cats, a duck, a guinea pig, and other pets made arrival to school a blast! An Art Dabble night added a bit of artistry with creating art projects using recycled materials. And for the final event, the PA collaborated with the Community Service group to launch a Blue/Gold food drive competition on Field Day, which was donated to McKenna's Wagon. The PA made a generous gift to the new outdoor gathering space on the East Campus as part of the Auction's Raise Your Paddle appeal, and provided a tent rental.

Parent Education

As part of our efforts to create a truly inclusive environment, the parent education speaker series was developed by the PA and the Parent Diversity Committee. This initiative provided the opportunity to show our understanding of who we are as a school community and our ongoing commitment to better serve our students. Several experts were invited to share their knowledge around a variety of topics on social identities.

Parent education workshops and speakers covered topics such as neurodiversity, race, and gender identity. Families were given the opportunity to develop strategies to support and nurture their children, while digging deeper into these topics.

Our Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Facilitator (in-residence), Dr. Omékongo Dibinga offered two sessions discussing the journey towards being anti-racist, entitled "A Movement vs a Moment." Dr. Bill Stixrud, a clinical neuropsychologist, discussed shared strategies around helping students understand their own learning needs and ways of navigating school and social settings

Jessy Molina and Theo George delved into the topic of gender identity and building a toolbox of vocabulary. And, Nicole Lee, author and CEO of Inclusive Life, helped families with strategies to navigate difficult conversations around social identifiers.

Faculty Appreciation

A thoughtful expression of appreciation for the hard-working faculty was planned for each month of the school year. But when an early September 2020 flash flood resulted in nearly a dozen faculty vehicles being totaled, the PA acted quickly to establish a community fund to help offset the insurance deductibles and other expenses related to replacing their vehicle, disbursing over \$19.000 in funds to those affected. After that unexpected situation—which demonstrated that being nimble is invaluablethe plan was back on track. By grade, parents organized and delivered personalized mugs filled with treats, stocked carts with healthy and fun nibbles, provided delicious Smoothie King smoothies, all accompanied by sweet and cheerful handmade notes and signs from students.

The PA elevated Faculty Appreciation week as they, along with WES Dragons, decorated the outside of WES in May, with huge signs, decorations, and chalk messages greeting faculty as they arrived on Monday morning. On Monday afternoon, a Captain Cookie food truck offered a yummy snack. Tuesday's treat was a bountiful buffet breakfast. A surprise video featuring more than 90 students expressing their appreciation topped off the week. Continuing an initiative established in 2019-2020, the Faculty & Staff Gift Fund provided welcome gifts to all faculty and staff in December and June. "Gestures like these go amazingly far in energizing our teachers and increase the positivity in the environment," wrote a faculty member.

BOOK FAIR

This year's Book Fair, held in January, was 100% virtual and featured a visit from children's author

Christine Soontornvat who presented virtually to students. The author visit was supported by the PA. Although it was scaled down from previous years, families still donated books to the library and classrooms, and alumni families purchased books. A relaunch of the Book Fair this summer will make buying books convenient for readers as they help support the WES Library. Next year's Book Fair will be held in person with an online component.

FATHERS CLUB

Wes Clark, Tony D'Emidio, and Peter Rosan were at the helm of the Fathers Club. Determination was key for this group that managed to convene five times during the fall and spring to chat and forge relationships. From chilly meet-ups in the WES parking lot to an awesome BBQ at Jon Bulman's house, and a final gathering at MatchBox, the Fathers Club looks forward to getting back to regular outings and activities in the coming year.

MOTHERS CLUB

Susan Awad, mother to two WES Dragons started the Mothers Club to help parents connect within and across grades and strengthen their connections. This group met twice this year, providing parents additional opportunities to get better acquainted with the WES community. They also look forward to regularly scheduled meetings next year.

USED UNIFORMS

We are grateful to Akiko Lattin and Claire Mezoughem who helped collect and sort gently-used clothing items that are sold in the used uniform shop. Proceeds of \$2,300 benefitted the Parents Association.
